Course Description:

This course will consider how violent encounters between groups of people in the Americas, Europe, the Middle East and Asia shaped modern global history from 1500 to the mid-twentieth century. Topics discussed include how contacts between native peoples and Europeans in the Americas led to genocides and the rise of nationalist movements by the nineteenth century. Discussions of European, Middle Eastern, and Asian history will focus on violence that ensued from encounters between different ethnic, religious, and political groups, spawning religious conflicts and wars.
