Course description

This course covers some major intellectual currents in Chinese history from ancient times until a few years ago. It is not a comprehensive treatment of Chinese intellectual history, much less a full survey of Chinese history. A textbook and three short works on Confucianism, Taoism, and Buddhism will cover varieties of Chinese thought that have influenced Chinese history.

The examinations will assess your knowledge of the material covered in class lectures and in assigned readings. Examination review sheets will be distributed about one week prior to each examination. Before each examination you should review your lecture notes *and* the assigned readings. Not everything in the examinations will come from the lectures; a good portion of the examination will be drawn directly from assigned readings.

The term essay is to be six to eight pages in length (double spaced, twelve-point print, around 1500 to 2000 words) and should be written with an introduction (including an obvious thesis statement), a body, and a conclusion. You should use at least *three* sources in your essay, and your essay should have a bibliography of these sources at the end. Any of the three required readings may be used as sources in your term essay, but *please note that all encyclopaedia articles and textbooks, including the one for this course, are unacceptable. The term essay is due on 2 April 2018.*

Plagiarism:

Plagiarism occurs when one submits or presents one's work in a course, or ideas and/or passages in a written piece of work, as if it were one's own work done expressly for that particular course, when, in fact, it is not. As noted in *The History Student's Handbook* (http://hist.ucalgary.ca/sites/hist.ucalgary.ca/files/history_students_handbook_2015.pdf), plagiarism may take several forms:

- Failure to cite sources properly may be considered plagiarism. This could include quotations, and wording used from another source but not acknowledged.
- Borrowed, purchased, and/or ghostwritten papers are considered plagiarism, as is submitting one's own work for more than one course without the permission of the instructor(s) involved.
- Extensive paraphrasing of one or a few sources is also considered plagiarism, even when notes are used, unless the essay is a critical analysis of those works.
- The use of notes does not justify the sustained presentation of another author's language and ideas as one's own.

Plagiarism is a serious academic offence and written work that appears to contain plagiarized passages will not be graded. All such work will be reported to the Faculty of Arts' associate deans of students who will apply the penalties specified in the *University of Calgary Calendar*.
